Something to ponder for morning drop offs:

Saying ‘goodbye’ to your children at school in the morning can be different for all families. Some children go quickly with a wave and a smile, others take time to adjust. Karen Young, a psychologist has some good advice around this. We thought it was worth a ponder.

“As long as you are still with them, their amygdala (the part of the brain responsible for anxiety) will have hope that the separation won’t happen, and it will keep the fight or flight response going. Once you leave, the amygdala registers futility. Only then can your young one’s brain and body rest. The neurochemical surge that is driving the physical, emotional and behavioural symptoms of anxiety will start to neutralise and their anxiety will start to ease. The sooner that happens, the sooner your child will settle and get on with the day. There might be big tears when you leave, and that’s okay. These tears are a sign the brain has registered futility, and it moving to adaption, which lies at the heart of resilience. It’s never easy watching someone you love in so much distress, but remind yourself that they are safe, that the tears will pass quickly, and that you are providing the experience that will build resilience and courage, and show them they can do hard things.” *Karen Young*

What to do... When you know they are in safe hands, **let the goodbye be loving, quick, and confident**. Our staff are really good at distracting children and comforting them in these situations. They will always ring you if they need to.

We love how our Kiss’n’Drop Zone (in the carpark) is working in the mornings! Well done to the parents who received Bee Cards last week for demonstrating the system at its best! Remember if you need to park the car to walk your child(ren) in, you’ll need to park on the roadside or in our front carpark.



School Notices:

6 Bricks Resources



Our staff have been busy learning about an exciting new learning tool for our kura. Six Bricks is a hands-on tool for learning. Through fun and short activities with sets of LEGO® DUPLO® bricks in six bright colours, children can practice their memory, movement, creativity and more. We can adapt activities and of course make our own activities to match the children's skills and interests. Every hub is lucky enough to have access to this amazing resource, provided for free by LEGO. We are looking forward to seeing how Six bricks will enhance our daily programme.

School Bus

Tamariki must have a bus ticket in order to catch the school bus. A bus ticket is \$20 for 10 rides and can be purchased at the school office or online. Please allow 2 days for online payments to be processed. There are no 'tick ups' - no bus ticket, no bus! Parents will be called to pick up their child/children. We recommend always being in credit at least 1 bus ticket per child.

School Stationery

The school office no longer sell or supply school stationery for students. Feel free to use any of the numerous stationery suppliers. However Warehouse Stationery at the Base is the closest stationery supplier and has all the pack for each class/hub. Please dojo your class teacher/s if you need to clarify.

Hearing and Vision Checks

Vision Hearing Technicians from Community and Southern Rural Health will be visiting our school on the 27th March. The objective of the test is to identify previously undetected vision and hearing problems.

Which children are routinely checked?

- Children who have not completed vision and hearing checks as part of their B4 School Check
- Children absent from previous visit, require rescreens or follow up
- New Immigrants
- Year 7 student's vision only

If there is a genuine hearing concern, parents/caregivers or teachers may request a hearing check - NB parents must consent to this. The Vision Hearing Technician will only be able to undertake a maximum of 5 screens on any visit. If there is a concern regarding vision, parents/caregivers are encouraged to seek advice from an optometrist. A subsidy is available for families/whanau that have a Community Services card or High Use Health card.

What tests are carried out?

Ears

- Audiometry (hearing test)
- Tympanometry – middle ear function test (only carried out when hearing test is not within a normal range)

Eyes

Long distance vision tests – not a complete visual examination, but a simple screening test. All of these checks are non-invasive, safe and should cause no discomfort. The Vision Hearing Technician will notify parents/caregivers of all test results and enter results on Ministry of Education database (Enrol).

The Vision Hearing Technician will obtain personal details from the school ie; names, date of birth and contact parents/caregivers if needed. The service may share this information with other health professionals involved in the children's care. If any parents/caregivers do not want their child to be checked, or their child is currently under specialist care for their vision or hearing, they should let the school know.



Around the Hubs

Tiitoki (Reception-Y1):

Tiitoki have started off the year with 9 new tamariki and 5 from last year. We have been working on Manaakitanga in our classroom, doing activities together and listening skills using 6 Bricks, as well as reading, handwriting, story writing, maths and swimming.

We have had a busy few weeks settling into our new space, getting to know the new routines, and diving into our learning. This term for maths we have been focusing on statistics. Tamariki have been learning how to write and count tally marks, and how to make a simple block graph with them. In one investigation we went out to record which type of vehicle drove past the most, and there were certainly a lot of cars!

In other learning, half of our class have been developing some great artwork, completing their self-portraits and practicing their painting techniques and proportions. The other half have been diving into science, so far learning about the human brain and how our eyes work!

Harakeke (Year 3-4)

We have spent the first few weeks back at school establishing class routines and expectations. Have a look below at what each kupu (word) means. Feel free to test our tamariki to see if they remember!

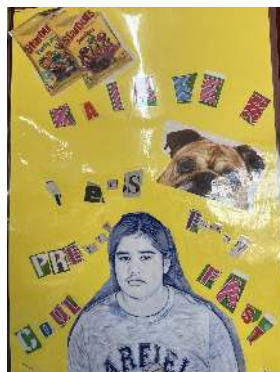

Kawakawa 5 (Year 5):

Kawakawa Tuarima have got straight into our mahi and have made an excellent start to the year. Our quote for the year is 'Who do you represent?'. We discussed that we represent not only ourselves, but our whaanau, kura and tīpuna. As a class we created our whaanau wall which has photos of the people most important to us, as well as self-portraits around how we value and see ourselves.

The *Great Kiwi Road Trip* is our inquiry focus for this term. So far we have travelled to Hamilton, Tauranga, Rotorua and Gisborne. Our tauira have enjoyed virtually travelling to these towns and researching different tourist attractions and costs. If you're heading to any of these places have a chat to the new town experts!



Kawakawa 6 (Year 6):

We have had a fantastic start to the year with students really striving together for success. I have loved witnessing students helping each other with swimming and demonstrating kindness and understanding to everyone in our hub.

Our inquiry this term is Financial Literacy. Each student has a bank account through the *Banqer Programme* and they earn money through a number of things including showing the 'Three Be's' and learner profiles. Most recently they have all applied for jobs in the classroom where they will get paid the minimum wage per hour (\$23.15) for a weekly salary of \$768.26 (after tax). With this money they need to pay for electricity, wifi and desk rental. It is something the students in Kawakawa Tuarima are very engaged in and they are wanting to complete their jobs well in hope of getting a 5% pay increase!

We have enjoyed using our Six Bricks resource in class. We have been using them for an array for things such as how we are feeling, assessing other people's learning and using them to work collaboratively.

Maanuka (Year 7/8):

Kia ora e te whaanau. What an awesome start to the year we've had in Maanuka! Most of our tamariki have settled into our learning environment and our hub routines quite well. Our learning space is humming at the moment!



As part of our learning around Waitangi Day we learned about *He Whakaputanga o te Rangatiratanga o Nu Tirenī - The Declaration of the United Tribes of New Zealand*. This document was signed on 28th October 1835 by 34 Northern chiefs and it was formally acknowledged by the British Crown in May 1839. By July 1839, 18 more chiefs signed it, including Potatau Te Wherowhero. Ask your tamariki what else they know about *He Whakaputanga o te Rangatiratanga o Nu Tirenī*!

Wow! It's so great to see so many people bringing their togs for swimming. Our focus so far has been on body position in the water, correct breaststroke arms and correct breaststroke kick. In the past we've noticed that this stroke is the one many tamariki struggle with, we were stoked to see lots of improvement after just one week! Keep up the good work and keep bringing your togs tamariki maa!



Home and School Support:

Home Learning with Mrs Foster (Learning Support Coordinator - LSC)

Welcome back, whaanau. I hope that 2024 has started well for you all. This term, I am on-site Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday to support aakonga, whaanau and kaiako. Feel free to pop in and say 'hello', especially if you are new to our kura.



What is an LSC?

The LSC role is fairly new (introduced in 2020) and varies between schools. My role here at Horotiu involves working with the leadership team to support aakonga who experience learning difficulties. Students may experience learning difficulties for a number of reasons, some of which include: limited hearing or eyesight, autism, dyslexia, ADHD, memory and speech delay. One thing I love about my role is that no two days are the same. I collaborate with lots of different people and am always learning something new. A highlight is working with students, finding out what their strengths are, and using these to help them overcome struggles they experience.

Creating Connections

This term is an important time for building relationships and working together to support our tamariki. We look forward to connecting with you and seeing what new experiences we can add to our kete in 2024.

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Kapa Haka (Atkore Unistrut Hamilton Opening):

During the holidays we were approached by representatives of Atkore Unistrut and invited to do a short performance as part of this new businesses' opening day on Thursday 8th February. This business is located down the road from us on Evolution Dr so we were able to walk down and walk back.
