It is an open invitation to visitors from Aotearoa and throughout the world, to join and to celebrate the unique and important customs and traditions of Kiingitanga, and of Maaori. Thousands flock to Turangawaewae Marae in Ngaruawahia each year to take part in a huge cultural and sporting festival. Some of our tamariki will be attending the koroneihana this year to help with waitressing.





#### Koromiko (Year 1-2)

# **Home and School Support:**

Home Learning with Mrs Foster (Learning Support Coordinator - LSC) Kia ora.

You may have heard the words "Structured Literacy" in the news recently and wondered what this means for your tamariki. Here at Horotiu. we are using The Better Start Literacy Approach (BSLA) from Y0-4. This structured literacy approach aims to enhance the early reading, writing and oral language skills of all children. It is based on research and has been successfully trialled in many New Zealand schools. There are other structured literacy approaches, but BSLA is supported by the Ministry of Education with over 50% of NZ kura now using this approach.



We are offering a workshop for whaanau on Tuesday 10th September at 2:45pm-3:15pm for those interested in finding out more about BSLA. There will be childcare options available during this time. Come along to ask questions and gain some helpful tips for helping your child read at home.

#### Here are a few reminders to support with helping your child read at home:

- You and the rest of your whānau are an important part of your child's reading and spelling journey. Any reading that you do with your child in another language you are fluent in, will help and support your child's literacy journey.
- Make sure reading is fun and interesting! Reading is not just about the books that come home from school. Written words are everywhere. On street signs, on the road, on packets, in magazines and on your phone!
- Bring your child's attention to print and help them read words wherever you see them! Give your child plenty of praise for their reading and writing attempts.
- It's not easy to learn to read and write a language, so plenty of encouragement and praise will help motivate your child to keep trying hard.
- Lots of modelling. Show your child letters and say the sound that they make.

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#### **Yummy Fruit Stickers**

This is the last term for collecting Yummy apple stickers. These Yummy stickers convert to school points which in turn earn us sports gear! The more stickers we collect the more, the sports gear we can order for our playground. Yummy stickers can be forwarded to the School Office.

#### School Hat - Price increase

Due to the cost of freight and embroidery, we need to raise the price of school hats by \$1.50. They will now cost \$20 to purchase. A reminder that students are all required to wear a wide-brimmed hat of some sort (it's not compulsory that its a school one) in Terms 1 and 4 to play safely beneath the hot sun.
